ASHLAND CITY COUNCIL REGULAR MEETING

November 16, 2017

A regular meeting of the Ashland City Council was held at the Ashland City Hall Council Chambers on the 16th day of November, 2017 at 7:00 p.m.

Notice of meeting was advertised in the Ashland Gazette on November 9, 2017. The Mayor and all Council Members received advance notice of the meeting and a copy of the agenda as shown by the Acknowledgment of Receipt of Notice. All proceedings hereafter shown were taken while the convened meeting was open to the public.

Mayor Grauerholz called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. The Pledge of Allegiance was recited. Roll call was taken and a quorum was declared. Mayor Grauerholz noted the Open Meetings Act that is posted on the south wall of the Council Chambers.

Motion by Gossin, second by Mollhoff to adopt the regular agenda with the amendment of moving Item G3 after Item F2.

Ron Styskal gave public comment regarding his complaint about a nuisance on the east side and about the amount of money paid by the City to JEO Consulting Group Inc.

Mayor Grauerholz opened a Public Hearing to Review Preliminary Plat for a Political Subdivision located at a Portion Of The Southwest And Northwest Quarters Of Section 1, Township 12 North, Range 9 East, located at approximately 1400 Dennis Dean Road at 7:05 p.m. Mark Palmer of Ashland Investment Company stated he was available for questions. Zoning Administrator Isom stated the recommendation from the Planning Commission was for approval as submitted. Palmer explained how the road will enter the development and the commercial area. He said there will be a temporary road while 9th

Avenue is shut down during construction. With no further comment, Mayor Grauerholz closed the Public Hearing at 7:09 p.m.

Mayor Grauerholz opened a Public Hearing to Review Final Plat for a Political Subdivision located at a Portion Of The Southwest And Northwest Quarters Of Section 1, Township 12 North, Range 9 East, located at approximately 1400 Dennis Dean Road at 7:09 p.m. Mark Palmer spoke clarifying a change on the preliminary and final plat of a seven foot side yard setback. Zoning Administrator Isom shared information about the reduced setbacks that was given to the Planning Commission. She said the Planning Commission recommended approval of the seven foot side yard setbacks and the plat as submitted. She gave the Council code information on fire protection. She noted fire protection kicks in with a 5-foot setback and 7-foot is 40% over what is required by code. Palmer said in the preliminary plat this increased the number of lots by five. He added the development plans to proceed with grading on just the residential portion this fall and grading will begin at access points next year. He said there will be a temporary road. Discussion was held regarding the side yard setbacks. Mayor Grauerholz commented on the travel of fire from one building to another by radiant heat. He said the travel of fire through radiant heat is directly proportional to the spacing between objects that are burnable; he is a big believer in a wide separation between structures and he would like the setback to stay at ten-foot. Bob Benes of Ashland Development commented on setbacks in other communities where he has built and he said didn't think he had built in a community with 10-foot setbacks. He noted the seven foot is a minimum and is the norm in smaller communities. John Carven asked if there will be any easements given for appliances on the side of the houses. Benes said there will be site plans and drainage plans. He said air conditioner units and window wells are allowed in the side yard setbacks but they cannot go into a utility easement. Isom said there is a specific section in the zoning code about permitted projections in the side yards. Isom said the City doesn't have any regulations about the type of materials a fence is constructed with. Palmer said there will be sidewalk on Dennis Dean Road and it will be up to the City to determine if it will be on one side or both sides of the road. He said conveyances will address fencing. With no further comment, Mayor Grauerholz closed the Public Hearing at 7:33 p.m.

Mayor Grauerholz opened a Public Hearing on proposed Ordinance 1144 – To vacate the alley in Block 10 Beetison's Addition to the City of Ashland at 7:33 p.m. Zoning Administrator Isom said this was a rerun of what was discussed before but now being brought forward as an ordinance. She said the earlier request was to vacate two alleys, a north-south one and an east-west one; and it was decided to vacate just the one alley as reflected in the ordinance. Council Member Anderson asked if there is any reason to maintain an easement for future utilities through the alley. Isom said the work that is needed to be done in the east-west alley to solve the drainage issue would make the alley un-drivable. She said the City has been running water and sewer in the street on the eastside and the gas and electricity runs in the north-south alley which is why it wasn't

vacated. She said the property owners need to do a retaining wall on the east-west alley. With no further comment, Mayor Grauerholz closed the Public Hearing at 7:36 p.m.

Motion by DeVries, second by Mollhoff to approve on third and final reading Ordinance 1143 - AN ORDINANCE TO CHANGE THE ZONING DISTRICT BOUNDARIES OF THE CITY OF ASHLAND, NEBRASKA, AS PROVIDED IN THE CITY OF ASHLAND MUNICIPAL ZONING ORDINANCE; TO AMEND THE CITY'S FUTURE LAND USE MAP; TO AMEND THE CITY'S OFFICIAL ZONING MAP; TO PROVIDE FOR THE EFFECTIVE DATE THEREOF; TO ORDER THE PUBLICATION OF THE ORDINANCE IN PAMPHLET FORM.

City Attorney Fahleson read the Title of Ordinance 1143.

City Attorney Fahleson read the Title of Ordinance 1145.

Council Member Mollhoff noted an error in Section One stating the subdivision was outside the city limits; this will be corrected for the second reading. Mayor Grauerholz commented on fire protection.

Rod Reisen spoke on behalf of the Ashland Area Economic Development Corporation giving an annual report. He said three committees were formed including business retention and expansion, marketing and promotion, and housing. He said the business and expansion group has been working with JEO on a Developer Toolbox. He said the marketing and promotion is looking at ways to let people know that Ashland is a good place to live, work and play including a video that will be updated. He continued stating the housing group has worked with Hanna Keelan on a Housing Study that will be presented at the December 20 AAEDC meeting. He said half of the study was paid by a

NIFA grant. He added the AAEDC will be the non-profit sponsor for an affordable housing grant application for the north side of town. He finished by saying he appreciated the support of the Council.

John Craven, owner of Reliable Plumbing, spoke to the Council regarding drainage issues at his Reliable building from the new parking lot sidewalk. He said he has gotten water into his shop building and nothing like that had happened in several years. He said the water is settling his rear building to where he can't get is doors open. City Administrator Quady said the sidewalk has been there about a month and a half. Carven said the sidewalk is about four inches above his grade and the grade of the dumpster pad falls toward the building. Quady described the grade and drainage off of the alley to the north. She added Public Works will be working on the area the week of the 27th. She said the Mayor suggested a curb on the property line with a positive slope for drainage going to the north through the parking lot. Craven said he is concerned about a grade change on his property, the shop flooding and the building settling. Council Member Gossin asked Craven to take pictures when the flooding is occurring. Craven discussed the construction of the wood floor in the building.

Motion by Mollhoff, second by Anderson to approve Pay Request #1 from Simon Contractors for the Silver Street Bridge in the amount of \$81,949.50.

City Administrator Quady said this is mostly for materials stored on site. She said she will be putting a reminder in the paper that the bridge is closed. She said the contractor is working with Bob Luebbe on coordinating the moving of the bridge trusses.

She said the cost will not be covered by the Department of Transportation and would be included in the bond. She added the bond ordinance will be in front of the Council soon. Discussion was held regarding getting a recommendation from the Historic Preservation Committee. Quady said she would bring the railing and lighting options back to the Council.
